The Victorian State Government has provided a ringing endorsement of the VFL, announcing a \$10 million redevelopment package in the state budget.

Eight VFL venues will share the \$10 million, which will be used to upgrade their facilities and amenities, which will, in turn, benefit players and the community.

On the back of Australian Football's 150 Years celebrations, it is a great result for Victorian football and in particular the VFL.

Clearly, the government's investment will help ensure the future viability of clubs while delivering better sporting facilities for the local community.

In seeking funding for VFL venues, the AFL and AFL Victoria had to demonstrate there would be benefits not only to football, but also to the community.

The funding will not only help VFL clubs become more economically sustainable, it will also ensure there is a clearly defined and structured pathway that will stimulate participation and nurture talented young footballers.

These VFL clubs are the hubs of each talent region and it is

important for the game's future that they have the necessary infrastructure for the players.

Thankfully, the government supported the initiative.

When the commitment of the AFL, AFL Victoria, individual VFL clubs and local councils is added to the government package there will be a substantial influx of money to the infrastructure of VFL grounds.

For example, Williamstown's historic Point Gellibrand ground will receive a \$3 million injection that will deliver more public seating, while its heritage-listed grandstand will be redeveloped with a new social room and new changerooms.

Box Hill will receive \$600,000 to develop a function room on top of its existing changerooms, and will also upgrade its coach's boxes and canteen.

And Sandringham will use its allocated funds to extend its

pavilion, improve its lighting and assist the council to replace the concrete fence along its ground's Beach Road side.

AFL Victoria will communicate with the clubs to ensure plans are ready and everyone is committed to the funded projects. It is hoped the works can begin before the end of this financial year.

Congratulations to Gavin Brown, the VFL Collingwood coach, for his induction into the Australian Football Hall Of Fame.

It's another endorsement of the VFL that it numbers two Hall Of Fame members, Brown and Port Melbourne coach Gary Ayres, among its coaching fraternity.

Certainly, it's been a big few weeks in more ways than one for the VFL.

Casey Scorpions coach Greg Hutchison left Bellerive Oval last month disappointed his side had lost but convinced he had seen a potential top-10 draft prospect.

After watching teenager Aaron Cornelius kick four goals to catapult Tasmania to a 19-point win over his side, Hutchison had no doubt the Devils key forward would be on an AFL list next season.

"He's a top-10 draft pick for sure," Hutchison said.

"He was simply outstanding against us. He's got great hands, is very good overhead, attacks the ball. There's a lot to like about him."

Hutchinson is not alone in his assessment.

Cornelius, 17, created such an impression at last year's NAB AFL Under-18 Championships that he was named

Choosing the Devil

Cornelius flagged as top-10 draft pick

All-Australian team and gained an AIS-AFL Academy scholarship.

During its tour to South Africa, the Academy squad played against a hybrid team from Perth. Cornelius played on Fremantle's Michael Johnson and most observers agreed he did extremely well.

Tasmania coach Daryn Cresswell is more tempered in his assessment, but acknowledges Cornelius oozes talent.

"He may have the best pair of hands I've seen," Cresswell said.

But Cresswell was quick to point out Cornelius has several deficiencies that he needs to work on. He said Cornelius had been inconsistent this season, but that was expected given it was his first full season against matureaged players.

Cresswell said he gave

Cornelius an introduction to the VFL late last year to help him gain a feel of the competition.

In one of those matches, Cornelius played on Mitch Thorpe, a Tasmanian who was Hawthorn's first selection at the 2006 NAB AFL National Draft. Cornelius held him to one goal.

"He was one of the players I had in my plans for 2008 right from the end of last season," Cresswell said.

Cornelius missed the round six match against North Ballarat because he was representing Tasmania in the qualifying rounds for the NAB AFL Under-18 Championships. His availability in the coming weeks will depend on the success of the Tassie Mariners, who Cornelius co-captains.

While he may be a name on most recruiters' lips, Cornelius is not getting too far ahead of himself.

The Year 12 student was "really enjoying" playing in the VFL and said it was "a bit of a thrill" to play on "blokes that you see the next week on TV playing in the AFL". "It's all pretty exciting,"

Cornelius said. And, for that matter,

so is Aaron Cornelius.

Podsiadly 150 and still going strong

Ask Werribee coach and former 10-year AFL player Simon Atkins why James Podsiadly didn't get the chance to play AFL and he can't explain it.

Atkins, who played with Footscray and Fitzroy, said some recruiters claimed Podsiadly was a one-dimensional forward.

In the lead-up to Podsiadly's 150th VFL game this weekend, Atkins said it was a criticism he did not accept.

"There's plenty of blokes at AFL (level) making good money at being a forward," Atkins said.

"He (Podsiadly) has got power, he's got strength, he's quick, takes a pack mark and usually his goal conversion is really good.

"I just don't know. If he had been taken as an older-age footballer, the club would have been rewarded for it.

But Podsiadly, previously rookie-listed by Essendon and Collingwood, doesn't get bogged down in what-if scenarios. He's enjoyed his time in the VFL, especially at Werribee, where his legend continues to grow.

"I had my chance and it wasn't me," Podsiadly said. "I'm pretty happy with what I'm doing outside football, I feel I've been lucky."

Podsiadly, in his final year of an exercise science course, said he was proud of his achievements over his nine VFL seasons.

He is particularly proud of representing Victoria in 2005 and 2007, and would dearly love to pull on the Big V again when Victoria travels to Adelaide later this month to tackle South Australia.

Playing for Werribee also means a lot to Podsiadly as he demonstrated when he turned down a big-money offer from an SANFL club several seasons ago.

"'Pods' showed a lot of faith in our football club and hopefully we can give something back to him," Atkins said.

Atkins said Podsiadly was one of those rare players who could change the course of a game on his own – as he showed against the Northern Bullants in round five.

But Podsiadly is still hoping to add several more chapters to his VFL career, beginning with helping Werribee return to the finals.

"We're going to get better," he declared.

Just as Podsiadly, himself, seems to be getting better and better with age.

This story is straight from the vault of *Ripley's Believe It or Not*.

Peder Whelan was once sent home from an under-14 try-out camp because he was considered too small.

Nothing unusual there, you say. Agreed, plenty of players' size, or lack of it, impacts on their progress.

But, here's the twist. Whelan, 22, now stands 207cm.

Yes, Whelan is the tallest VFLlisted player and only Fremantle's Aaron Sandilands, whom Whelan refers to as a "giant", and Western Bulldog Peter Street, are taller.

Whelan, who has made an immediate impact in his first season with Frankston, admitted he was a late bloomer.

In Year 10, he grew from about 180cm to 193cm, then did not stop.

"I think I stopped last year," said Whelan who was last officially measured when he attended a screening session with Collingwood in 2006.

Whelan journeyed to Frankston for a try-out in his first season out of junior football, but decided he would be better served fine-tuning his game at local club Mornington.

Several times over the course of the past few years Whelan considered trying out with Frankston, but stuck with Mornington.

But after overcoming knee problems and with his younger brother Dale making the Dolphins list last season, Whelan decided to join Frankston for the 2008 season. "I wanted to play with my brother and I thought I would just see how I would measure up to a really good standard and see if I could go the next step," Whelan said.

Certainly, Whelan arrived at Frankston with modest goals, aiming to break into the senior side at some stage during the season and play three games.

With the first third of the season now behind us, Whelan has had to reset those goals.

With Chris Oliver injured, Frankston coach Brett Lovett fast-tracked Whelan into the senior team.

And Whelan has impressed his coach with his deceptive speed and skill but his football brain, in particular, has stood out.

"He hits the ball to the right spots and at the right time," Lovett said.

Whelan was a standout for the Dolphins in their round five match against Port Melbourne, quickly making the jump from the Mornington Peninsula Football League to the infinitely quicker and more skilful VFL.

"It's good to compete against the guys who are on AFL lists or who have played AFL,"

he said.

"I'm enjoying that side of it, I'm just happy to hold my own."

CALL US FOR ALL YOUR VIDEO PRODUCTION NEEDS Few, if any, matches provoked - and continue to provoke – as much controversy as the 1971 VFA Grand Final between Dandenong and Preston.

At the heart of the controversy is a free kick field umpire Jim McMaster awarded to Dandenong full-forward Jim 'Frosty' Miller in front of goal before the opening bounce.

Miller kicked a goal from the free kick. It would prove telling as Dandenong won the Grand Final by six points.

Preston lodged a protest, but the VFA Board voted to accept McMaster's decision.

More than 36-years later, Peter Weightman, the Preston rover who was in the middle of the Junction Oval as the drama unfolded, has no doubt a free kick should not have been awarded.

"Barry Leslie (the Preston fullback) never physically intimidated anybody," Weightman said. "If someone bumped Barry he would be in a jostle, but he never threw a punch."

"'Frosty' took a dive, there's no doubt about it. I saw the incident."

While the '71 Grand Final rates as one of the most explosive moments in VFA/VFL history, the Bullants, formed in 1882 and admitted to the VFA in 1903, have a proud history. And Weightman, who attended his first match at Cramer Street as a two-year-old, has been there for half a century of it.

For 19 years, Weightman played and then coached the Bullants in a collective 268 senior

games. His eight years, split over two stints, is the longest tenure of any Preston coach.

He was also an assistant coach under Ray Shaw, when Preston won back-to-back premierships in 1983-84.

But it is his time under Hawthorn premiership coach Alan Joyce, who took Preston to the first of its four VFA flags in 1968, which provides some of his fondest memories.

"I remember 'Joycey' would ask every player 'Do you want to play for Preston?'," he said. "For me it was a no-brainer. I had followed the club since I was two." Weightman played alongside many great players, including J.J. Liston Trophy winners Laurie Hill, Dick Telford and Ray Shaw. Impressively, Preston boasts more Liston Trophy winners (11) than any other club.

Weightman nominated Jamie Shaw, the prolific goalkicker of the late 1980s who averaged 5.34 goals per game – the best in VFA/VFL history – as the most gifted player he coached.

In recent years the club has undergone several name changes, adding even more chapters to the rich history of the Bullants.

Casey regains its sting

Scorpions to continue strong start to 2008



After losing a number of its quality, experienced VFL campaigners at the end of last season, the Casey Scorpions were discounted as a 2008 finals contender by most pundits.

Not only did they lose five-time best and fairest winner Steve Harrison, last year's captain Nigel Carmody, ex-Kangaroo Troy Makepeace and 2006 best and fairest winner David Biaggi, they did not replace them with any bigname off-season signings.

New coach Greg Hutchison was left with a raw group of young players, who he could top up with whatever players were available from the club's AFL affiliate St Kilda. Despite this, the Scorpions find themselves sitting in third position after six rounds and have a golden opportunity to consolidate their standing this Saturday against Collingwood.

The Magpies have only two wins this season after a difficult start to their life as a stand-alone VFL club.

Casey enters this match buoyed by its 118-point win against Northern Bullants in round six, and it is hard to see Collingwood troubling it.

Tasmania is undefeated at home this season and will be looking to continue that record when it hosts Sandringham this Saturday. While the Devils have always struggled against the Zebras, they will fancy their chances against a Sandringham team that is coming off a disappointing 64-point loss to Williamstown.

Sandringham will rebound but Tasmania is capable of causing an upset.

Slowly, but surely Geelong is climbing its way back up the ladder after a slow start to the season, and it's unlikely the Coburg Tigers will be able to stop its ascent.

After dropping its first two matches by more than eight goals, Werribee has got its season back on track with three wins from its past four matches with its only loss in that stretch against ladderleader North Ballarat.

Werribee can put itself in the eight for the first time this season when its treks to Frankston, which will still be reeling from its narrow loss to Bendigo. Dolphins captain Shaun Pollard faces the unenviable task of trying to subdue James Podsiadly in his 150th match.

Meanwhile, North Ballarat ventures to Cramer Street to meet the Northern Bullants and should have too much overall class.

And, in round seven's other games, Port Melbourne should continue the Box Hill Hawks' misery by extending their losing streak this season to seven, while the Bendigo Bombers, despite being at home, should be overpowered by a Williamstown side that is getting stronger by the week. For a footballer mental strength is often just as an important as any of his god-given physical attributes and talent. The ability to deal with adversity often determines whether a player can forge a successful, long-term career.

Hawk to fly again

Batsanis OK now he's beaten OP

2006 best and fairest winner, knows a thing or two about adversity. Batsanis headed to South Australia last year bursting with enthusiasm after being rookie listed by Port Adelaide. After an encouraging preseason, Batsanis entered the season full of hope. Six weeks later, though, the then 19-year-old's world was turned on its head. He came down with osteitis pubis and as hard as he tried to play through it, he eventually succumbed to the debilitating condition. "At the end of the year they (the Power) said my groin wasn't up to scratch and there were 15-16 players of my height (178cm) and size (78 kg) going for the same spot," Batsanis said. "It was a bit frustrating because I had a good first half of the year. Everything was going well then OP (osteitis

pubis) kicked in and that ruined my season.

"It was pretty disappointing. Obviously, I got the opportunity then it was gone. I'm pretty strong in that area where I can fight back."

Free of osteitis pubis, Batsanis trained throughout the 2008 pre-season with Hawthorn in a bid to relaunch his AFL career. It wasn't to be, but Batsanis was encouraged when Hawthorn coach Alastair Clarkson rang him to say the Hawks were keen to keep an eye on him and suggested he play with Box Hill Hawks.

The idea appealed to Batsanis, who had been impressed during pre-season with Barry Mitchell, the Hawks' new development coach and also Box Hill's coach.

South Australian club Woodville-West Torrens and several other VFL clubs contacted Batsanis, but he eventually signed with Box Hill.

"I had got to know Barry (Mitchell) really well while I was there," Batsanis said.

"In the end it was pretty easy. I went straight down to Box Hill. I have an opportunity at Box Hill where I can impress the guys at Hawthorn or another (AFL) club."

Batsanis has settled well into the VFL, though Box Hill's start to the season has been below expectations as it adjusts to its new coach and game plan.

But Batsanis says it would be folly to suggest the club can't fight back. And if anyone knows about fighting back it's Batsanis.

The running man

One Bomber's inspiring journey to the AFL

Adrian Hickmott was three games into the 2006 season as coach of Rumbalara, a team of mostly indigenous people in the Murray Football League, when he witnessed something he'd never seen before at senior level.

Hickmott, an 11-year AFL player at Geelong and Carlton, watched one of his players – so frustrated at what was unfolding – take himself from the ground.

Coaching from the boundary, Hickmott called him over, but the young player walked away. With his focus back on the match, Hickmott thought nothing more of it until five minutes later when he decided to bring the player back on to the ground.

"I went to speak to him and he wasn't there," Hickmott said. "I asked if he had gone to the toilet, but someone said see that white car leaving the ground, he's driving it."

Two years later and the player who made that quick getaway was making his AFL debut for Essendon against Port Adelaide at Telstra Dome in round seven.

His name? Jarrod Atkinson. Soon after his 'runner' Atkinson returned to Rumbalara, won its best and fairest, gained a pre-season with the Bendigo Bombers, making their list and playing 14 VFL games, before earning a rookie spot

It is, Hickmott, says a great story.

For Hickmott, it illustrates how someone, who worked hard to overcome his frustrations and made football his priority, succeeded.

Hickmott said he spoke to Atkinson, then 21, the week after his early exit in a bid to convince him to stay in the structured confines of Rumbalara, which is attached to the Academy of Sport Health and Education.

"It wasn't about Adrian Hickmott convincing him, it was about Jarrod Atkinson deciding what road he wanted to take," Hickmott said.

Although Atkinson wasn't fully fit, his potential was readily evident.

In the first half of the season, Rumbalara lost its matches by an average 80-100 points, but when Atkinson committed to the program that losing margin fell to between 12-20 points.

"He had the speed and he could jump over heads and kick the ball 60 metres and hit a target," Hickmott said.

"His athleticism really stood out and when he got himself fit his confidence grew and grew. The team was happy to feed him the ball so he could run the length of the ground." Hickmott said aspiring footballers should see the Jarrod Atkinson story as proof they could live out their dreams. One of the first players that Daryn Cresswell contacted when he was appointed Tasmania coach was Brodie Moles.

Although listed by the Devils in 2005, Moles had slipped off most people's football radar when he did not play in the VFL that season nor the following season.

Hampered by a knee injury, Moles played sporadically with Glenorchy in a local league. But Cresswell saw one of those games and instantly had Moles in his plans for Tasmania in 2007.

It's history now Moles played 12 games for the Devils last year, impressing the Western Bulldogs and North Melbourne enough to be offered a pre-season before Geelong rookie listed him.

For Cresswell, Moles is a terrific story of a mature-aged player given the chance to play at the AFL level after just one season in the VFL.

"Brodie Moles is a star," Cresswell said. "He has all the attributes to play AFL."

"Now that he's at Geelong he'll develop further. He played against us in round three and you could just see that he's come on so much."

Moles, 22, was surprised Geelong selected him in the NAB AFL Rookie Draft as his only contact with the reigning premier had been a five-minute telephone conversation with its recruiting manager Stephen Wells.

"Geelong was the last club I thought would want to draft me," Moles said.

"I'm very privileged and happy to be at Geelong."

One of the fringe benefits for Moles is that he trains with Geelong's AFL-listed players and can tap into the knowledge of Brownlow medallist Jimmy Bartel, Gary Ablett jnr and Joel Corey.

"It's amazing," Moles said. "You can go up to any of those guys and they are only too willing to lend you a hand," he said.

Geelong's VFL coach Leigh Tudor said Moles had soaked up all the advice given to him by the coaching staff and players and, as a result, had improved.

Tudor said Geelong had been impressed last season by Moles' understanding of the game, his ability to read the play as well as his skill level.

"There was a lot to work with," Tudor said.

Importantly, he said Moles transferred what he learned on the training track into matches and become an effective contributor for the Cats in the VFL.

Impressive form with Tasmania last year paved the way for Brodie Moles' selection as an AFL rookie. What is a good story will become even better if Brodie Moles continues to impress and is elevated to the Cats' AFL list.



The Scorpion King

Matthews youngest captain for 40 years



Kyle Matthews journeyed back in time during the VFL split round at the start of the month.

With Casey Scorpions rostered on the first weekend of the split round five, Matthews, who missed the first four matches this season with a strained medial ligament, took the opportunity to have a hit-out.

Matthews returned to his junior club Ringwood in division two of the Eastern Football League. Not surprisingly, the 22-year-old, a member of the VFL Team Of The Year in his only two seasons in the competition (2006, 2007), racked up countless possessions as Ringwood ran out 88-point winners.

Just how far Matthews has come since he arrived at the Scorpions as a skinny, unheralded player in 2006 was plain for all to see.

"You realise the difference," Matthews said. "It's definitely made me a better player."

In addition to being named in the VFL Team Of The Year, Matthews finished third in the Scorpions' best and fairest last year. And, this year, Matthews was appointed Scorpions captain, the youngest player to be given the honour in the past 40 years, according to club general manager Brian Woodman.

With the club's previous two captains and most experienced players Steve Harrison and Nigel Carmody both departing in the offseason, Matthews found himself the most experienced player at the club with just 36 VFL games.

Matthews, whose link with the club goes back to his grandfather Tommy Turner, the club's head trainer in the 1970s.

He had not even contemplated he would be considered as captain of the club, but when coach Greg Hutchison ran the idea past him during the preseason he jumped at it.

"I didn't think I would get it, but I'm pretty honoured with the position," Matthews said.

"It really is a big honour. Following Steve (Harrison), who won five best and fairests, and Nigel (Carmody), who was captain last year, they're pretty big shoes to fill.

"'Hutchy' said I didn't need to change anything as a player, just be myself and play as I have in the past, but it does put a little extra pressure on you"

Unfortunately, after straining a medial ligament three days before the season, Matthews was not able to take the field in his new role until round five.

But with the injury behind him, Matthews is focused on leading the Scorpions into the finals.

This week's AFL Victoria Volunteer of the Week is Allan Chandler from the Coburg Districts Football Club.





Ex-Bullant takes flight

New Hawk Morrell happy under Mitchell

Forget the conspiracy theories, there was nothing sinister about Digby Morrell's move from the Northern Bullants to the Box Hill Hawks this season.

After four seasons at the Bullants, the past two as a VFL player and the first two as a Carlton-listed player, Morrell shocked many with his move.

But ask Morrell his reasons for moving and he quickly sets the record straight.

Morrell, 28, said he switched clubs "wholely and solely" to follow Barry Mitchell, his coach at the Northern Bullants, to Box Hill.

Sure, Morrell admits he wasn't a fan of the Bullants' decision to appoint a playing coach in 2008, but he stresses he enjoyed his time at Cramer Street and wishes the club well.

"I have a good relationship with Barry," Morrell said. "I think he's a super coach. He's a very smart operator, he knows when to pull the right moves."

"Personally I thought I needed a bit of a change, to freshen up.

"And it's definitely done that. Apart from being 0-6 (after round six), it has been an enjoyable change."

Morrell says the Box Hill Hawks are much better than their current record suggests. He shared the pre-season consensus Box Hill would finish in the top half of the ladder given its extensive recruiting, but notes it has been hurt by Hawthorn's extensive injury list, which has limited the number of AFL players flowing back to the VFL so far this season.

"I still think we will definitely be a force," he said. "We will get three to four Hawthorn players back this week and a couple the week after."

"Once we get them back, and if we can get three wins before the half-way mark and then get on a roll in the second half, we can still sneak into the eight."

Morrell, now over the rib injury that restricted him to 11 games last season, admitted his own form had been "a bit patchy".

Given his impact in previous seasons, especially in 2006 when he was a key player in the Bullants' dominant home and away season, Morrell said his two-goal return this season had been "disappointing".

Mitchell has used Morrell in a slightly varied role up the ground, but Morrell believes he, like the team, is far from done in 2008.

"The fitness is definitely there," he said. "It's just about getting my hands on the ball." Digby Morrell is enjoying his new life as a Box Hill Hawk.






