## FIRST SOUTH PACIFIC GAMES

The idea of holding the South Pacific Games originated with Dr. A. H. Sahu Khan who was one of Fiji's representatives at the meeting of the South Pacific Commission at Rabaul in 1959. The idea was adopted and led to representatives of nine territories meeting at Noumea in March 1961 and Mr. L. O. Simpson, Fiji delegate, was appointed Chairman. Largely as a result of the latter's enthusiasm, Fiji was offered the honour of staging the First Games.

On receiving this invitation, the Fiji Amateur Sports Association consulted the Government which gave its blessing and the offer was accepted.

The Fiji Amateur Sports Association then appointed a Chairman with a nucleus of an Organising Committee with instructions to get on with it. Simultaneously it appointed under the terms of the draft constitution, the first Council consisting of Mr. L. R. Martin, Chairman; Mr L. O. Simpson, Secretary and Mr S. W. Meeks, Treasurer. Messrs. Simpson and Meeks held the same office on the Organising Committee. Unfortunately, not long afterwards, Mr Simpson returned to New Zealand where however, in spite of distance, he continued to give much valuable assistance.





## Introduction . . . .

This report has been written with the object of giving as much help as possible to those who will take up the torch at Noumea, New Caledonia, in staging the Second Games in 1966 — and those who follow.

Inevitably in tackling a once-in-a-generation task of such a magnitude, committees learn by experience. Next time they would tackle some of the problems in a different way. In Suva, the Organising Committee encountered many difficulties in estimating needs, demands, quantities and, above all, the standards to be aimed at.

It was felt from the beginning that the standard of organisation set would play a big part in establishing the Games as a living idea. To set the standard of accommodation too high would result in unnecessary expenditure by the visiting teams who, in addition to having to pay their way to Suva, had to pay for their accommodation; to set them too low, would lead to dissatisfaction. On the other hand, the organisational standards for the sports had to be as high as possible and, in any event, had to comply with the appropriate international regulations and in certain aspects had to pass the scrutiny of official international observers.

So that this report could be of maximum assistance in staging future South Pacific Games, it contains adverse comment when considered useful;

sins of omission and commission are recorded as well as the successes. These comments and recommendations are not intended as tendentious criticisms but as a guide to the next games.

The first games were successful and the athletes now know each other and each other's standards and we can look to much higher standards and closer competition in the next Games.

The keynote of the success of the organisation of the Games was the general effort by all sections of the community and no one can assess the extent of the services, large and small, that were given, whilst the total voluntary help in terms of man hours was prodigious. The Government and Suva City Council helped greatly, whilst the Fiji Military Forces and the Royal New Zealand Air Force assisted to the limit of their resources.

The task of the Organising Committee extended over three and a half years and of the sub-committees over varying lengthy periods. Members of the committees were largely professional and businessmen who gave leisure hours and many working hours to tedious details and planning.

The final act in connection with the First South Pacific Games is the publication of this Official History and it is presented in the hope that it will help to make the second Games at Noumea an even greater success: **Bon chance Nouvelle Caledonie**.



## ASSOCIATION FOOTBALL

All matches except one were played at Buckhurst Park in Suva: one match, between the British Solomon Islands Protectorate and Fiji, was played at Lautoka on Churchili Park.

#### PARTICIPANTS AND METHOD OF PLAY-OFF


Six territories took part, the British Solomon Islands Protectorate, Fiji, French Polynesia, New Caledonia, the New Hebrides and Papua/New Guinea. The competition was on a knockout basis with the draw carried out prior to the arrival of the teams.

It was appreciated that this was unsatisfactory but with the facilities and time available, there was no alternative with the number of entrants.

There was considerable adverse criticism of this arrangement but it was not practicable to make other arrangements when the teams arrived. It was particularly unfortunate that the two strongest teams met in their first match, namely New Caledonia and French Polynesia, and this was virtually the final.

#### **RULES**

All matches were played under the Rules of the Federation Internationale de Football Association to whom a report had to be sent under the regulations. Considerable difficulty was later experienced by these reports not being completed immediately after each game and before the officials were scattered all over the Pacific.



## **ATHLETICS**

#### **OFFICIALS**

I.A.A.F. Rules provided the basic requirements for an international meeting; the absolute minimum of officials is about 70 - 80; reference to the official programme will show their number and titles. In addition, three Suva schools were good enough to provide some twenty-five schoolboys as runners and carriers, and most helpful they were. H.M.S. Cook provided nine officials, whose promptness and efficiency were noteworthy. Seventy-five officials were appointed and briefed on behalf of the Fiji Amateur Athletics Association and a further eleven were nominated (and appointed) from competing territories. This total was adequate but it would have been even better to have had more available. In the nature of things, it was unlikely that it would be possible to find such a large number of people with experience as well as enthusiasm but their application to the many problems brought its reward — the meeting proceeded satisfactorily. Many tributes were paid to the officials for their completely just and careful handling of competitors and rules.

#### **EQUIPMENT**

The technical equipment was ordered many months before the Games; it was sufficient in quantity and in quality and no complaints were received. Although better equipment can in fact be obtained, it would not yet seem necessary to do so in Games of this nature. All technical equipment was weighed and measured under the IAAF Rules, and certified accordingly by the Government Weights and Measures Inspector. A point which a future Organising Committee could well bear in mind is that if there is more than one village centre with training facilities, a fairly

large amount of practice equipment is required. Items such as ground scoreboards, take-off boards, stands for judges and timekeepers, flags and a host of other items were prepared by the Public Works Department.

#### COMPETITORS

The behaviour of competitors within the arena was excellent; they reacted very well to the firm but sympathetic handling of the Chief Marshal and his assistants. No problems were reported regarding numbering. Only on one occasion, as far as is known, were competitors too late in arrival in the marshalling area to get inside the arena for their event. It is recommended that the system be retained whereby a group of ladies at the village(s) sews on competitors' numbers. Correct and visible numbering is a vital necessity from the competitors', officials' and the public point of view.

#### ARENA

In spite of the tremendously heavy rainfall experienced during the month, (five times the normal expectation of rain for the month fell in the first twenty-one days) the track was in excellent condition, indeed it elicited many favourable even astonished comments from visiting competitors and officials. The relaying of the entire track and the new drainage system worked extremely well.

#### CONTROL (RECORDING) ROOM

This was on a small scale only (3 recorders and a typist) and the press representatives did not ask for copies of results although these were ready if requested. The Press and Radio managed very well from the announcing and from scoreboard results. Nine separate types of forms (cyclostyled) were

used for recording, and were found satisfactory. Two complete sets of records of events were sent from the appropriate referee, one to the Arena Manager and one to the Control Room. (One complete set has been lodged with the Games Council).

#### TIMEKEEPING

Omega watches were provided (split-second timing) and were entirely satisfactory. The Technical Committee recommends that in future Games, there should be additional watches on third place in accordance (for example) with Olympic Rules 9 and 10, I.A.A.F. Rules 1963. In these First Games, watches were used as follows:—

First place : 3 and 1 alternative
Second place: 3
Third
Fourth
Fifth
Sixth

There was no occasion on which a significant difference between watches was revealed on first and second places but on two occasions the individual times on fourth, fifth and sixth places appear to have gone awry. Considering the amount of time available for practice and training, this is a most satisfactory result.

#### JUDGING

An often invidious job well done, and credit goes to the Chief Judge and his officials.

#### MEASURING

A Cantabrian datum apparatus was provided but it was not used, (a) because of its complexities and the time required to set it up and to train officials in its use and, (b), because it was felt that officials could move faster in the actual measuring of throws and jumps using the normal tapes. These proved perfectly satisfactory and the field events moved along at a reasonable pace, both from the point of view of programme timing and convenience of competitors. All measuring apparatus was certified by the Official Weights and Measures Inspector.

#### VICTORY CEREMONIES

These went off well with the usual complexities of events finishing earlier or later than expected, competitors doubling in events, trying to disappear etc. The Ceremonial Officer has of course to remain in close liaison with the general Ceremonies Committee besides watching the particular requirements of an Athletics programme.






#### ANNOUNCING

The possible difficulties arising from the fact that many competitors and officials from the French territories had little English, were met by providing an interpreter with the Starter and Referees and by announcements over the PA system in French following English. After the first day when the organisation was shaking down, a good flow of information was kept up by the announcer (who had also technical responsibility for the P.A. and recording/reply equipment).


#### PROGRAMME

The programme, in the form of printers' proofs, was presented to the Technical Committee the day before each day of athletics. This seemed to work well and there were very few alterations.





- (b) that competing territories give at least three months advance notice, to the host territory, of the probable number of competitors for each race;
- (c) that the decathlon be included in the programme if at all possible;
- (d) that there be semi-finals in the 100 metres events and that not less than three, preferably four, competitors go forward from the heats of a first round to the next round:
- (e) that consideration be given to introducing qualifying heights/distances in field events subject of course to the minimum number of competitors going forward to finals as provided in I.A.A.F. rules. The Committee did not however think it advisable that such qualifying standards should be decided before the convening of the Technical Committee for the 1966 Games with all territories represented;

- (f) that at the 1966 Games, Athletics be allocated a 4-day programme to allow maximum time for the recuperation of competitors in more than one event;
- (g) that Athletics, as the basic and major sport in the Games programme, be allocated every favourable consideration by the Organising Committee and that in particular the Athletics arena be not shared with any other sport.

#### PREPARATION OF PROGRAMME

This was carried out by the Arena Manager who was also the Secretary of the Athletics Technical Committee. This was too great a burden in addition to his other work and someone should be appointed, responsible to the Secretary, for the preparation of the programme.

#### INTERNATIONAL OBSERVER AND JURY OF APPEAL

Mr. F. W. Humphreys of the Australian Amateur Athletic Union was appointed by the I.A.A.F. as its Observer to the Games. He had been Arena Manager at the Commonwealth and Empire Games at Perth in 1962 and the I.A.A.F. could not have selected a more knowledgeable and pleasant representative; his great experience of Athletics was of enormous value and all benefited from his stay in Fiji. Mr Humphreys also served as Chairman of the Jury of Appeal, the two other members being Mr. D. W. Murty (P.N.G.) and Mr W P Ragg (President of the Fiji A.A.A.). Only once (3000 metres Steeplechase) were they called upon to act as a Jury and the result satisfied everyone.

## INDOOR BASKETBALL-MEN

Seven territories took part in this event which was played partly at night and ran smoothly from start to finish: it was well supported, spectators filling the available accommodation fully for all matches. Starting times were strictly adhered to throughout and transport arrangements worked very well. In view of the cramped programme, this was most important.

#### VENUE

The matches were played at Buckhurst Park on concrete on what are normally two minimum sized standard courts. These lines were painted out, and the posts moved to make one international standard court at right-angles to the normal direction of play. This provided a better court with ample space around.

#### PRACTICE TRAINING

Practice was on the match court during the day on a roster system and was thus not available for night training. This was unsatisfactory and in future night training facilities should be available under conditions identical to those under which the matches are played.

#### AFFILIATION

This is the only sport in which the International Association accepted an affiliation from the South Pacific Games Council on behalf of all participating territories. It is the responsibility of the Council to see that this is paid annually and not lost sight of. The affiliation fee has been paid for 1964 and the Secretary of the Federation Internationale de Basketball Amateur, at Munich informed of the change of address of the Council.

#### ORGANISATION

Considerable attention was given for three weeks prior to the Games to the training of local officials and this paid off handsomely in the efficient handling of the event.

As a result of an appeal for help to the Royal New Zealand Air Force, they arranged for the posting of two experienced referees from New Zealand for the duration of the Games. This was of immense help.

#### COMMENT

- The match series was too compressed; it should be spread over a much longer period.
- That the flood-lighting be of a very much higher intensity. The inadequacy of the lighting was the subject of considerable adverse criticism. Theoretically it was strong enough but in practice it was not.
- It is much better if the matches be played indoors as the name implies. This would make the lighting problem much easier.

## WOMENS SEVEN-ASIDE BASKETBALL

Five territories took part in the competition which was played on the league system.

#### **VENUE**

Matches were played on a grass court on Albert Park next to the Volleyball and as the weather turned out, this was satisfactory but provision had been made to play on hard courts had the weather been bad.

#### PRACTICE COURTS

Four practice grass courts were available in the Botanical Gardens and two at Veiuto: this was more than enough but each team should have a court to itself either morning or afternoon each day.

#### SURFACE OF COURTS

Whatever the surface that the matches are played on, it is most important that the practice courts be of the same material.

#### REFEREES

None of the territories had referees of the necessary standard, so private arrangements were made with two well known New Zealand referees to come up to Fiji.

It is recommended on future occasions, if it is necessary, the New Zealand Women's Basketball Association be approached to provide two referees of the necessary calibre.

#### MARKING PLAYERS



## BOXING

There were forty-four boxers from five territories and the contests were boxed off on three nights to the satisfaction of the Association Internationale de Boxe Amateur's Official Observer, Mr. J. A. V. Castle, of Sydney.

Those arranging the boxing were extremely fortunate in having Mr. Castle appointed as the A.I.B.A. representative. With his vast experience of international boxing, including Melbourne and Perth Games, he was able to show the local committee just how it should be done, and those responsible for the organisation were most grateful for Mr Castle's advice and help.

Under the constitution, three entries were permitted in each weight but no territory took advantage of this. Unfortunately in the Flyweight and Heavyweight divisions, the only entries were from Fiji which put in two entries in each event in order to make up numbers. No medals were awarded in the Flyweight and Heavyweight divisions in the absence of international competition.

The standard varied tremendously and it was obvious that many of the competitors were not conversant with all the rules and before the next Games, team managers should ensure that all team members are not only completely au fait with the rules, but also with the manner in which the referee gives his instructions in the ring: this is done in mime. Instruction to all teams was offered prior to boxing starting but it was obvious that this instruction was not assimilated.

#### TRAINING


Three training quarters were available, each with a ring. Fiji with much the larger team, used their own headquarters, the other two rings being available from 9 to 12 and from 2 to 5 for the visiting teams. Each team thus had the use of a ring for three hours in the morning and afternoon, according to their choice.

## AFFILIATION TO ASSOCIATION INTERNATIONALE DE BOXE AMATEUR

Papua/New Guinea and Fiji are affiliated direct to the Association Internationale de Boxe Amateur and, American Samoa, through their National parent Association. Special arrangements were made with the Association Internationale de Boxe Amateur for Tonga and the Cook Islands to affiliate with Fiji and approval has been received for this method of affiliation to continue, the Fiji Amateur Boxing Association having appointed a representative in each of these territories. This indirect affiliation is however of a temporary nature and is subject to review.

#### **DRESS**

The A.I.B.A. representative, in view of the circumstances, was given discretionary powers in connection with rules. This was used with regard to Competitors' Dress Rules 4 (a) and (b). It is possible that this flexibility will not be permitted at the next Games but in any event it is to the advantage of competitors to have some form of footwear to avoid the risk of slipping.

#### VENUES

It was originally decided to hold the boxing in the Town Hall and a dress rehearsal was held there against an Australian University team. Seating was available for only 550 in all, and it was obvious from the dress rehearsal that this would not be enough. A transit shed was therefore made available on the wharf by the Comptroller of Customs in which 1,200 could be seated and on the second and third nights all space was occupied. On the final night several hundred had to be turned away.

In order to make the maximum use of the shed, the dressing rooms had to be some seventy yards away and were connected to the ring-side by telephone to the Arena Manager's table. There was enough space in the dressing rooms for the boxers to warm up, also a good supply of couches for massage and resting. Four taxis were used to take the boxers and their seconds to and from the dressing rooms. There was a marshalling steward in each taxi.

To avoid delay, as the first pair of boxers were entering the ring, the next pair were put into their respective taxis and brought up to the entrance of the shed, thus as one pair of boxers left the arena the next pair was coming in. In spite of several bouts ending prematurely, there were no delays.

#### SCOREBOARD

With the bouts succeeding each other quickly, difficulty was found in getting the five judges' scores up fast enough and valuable seconds could have been saved had there been a telephone direct to the scoreboard.

#### THE RING

The ring was to a local design and was considered very satisfactory from all aspects.

#### WEIGHING IN

Three scales were used for the actual weighing with a fourth one available for any boxer who wished to check his weight prior to weighing in. There was also a set of scales available at each of the training venues. All scales were checked by the Weights and Measures Inspector before use. The weighing in was done at one of the training centres as were the medical examinations.

At the first medical examination and weighing in, a team of four doctors conducted the examinations — at subsequent examinations, two doctors were present, the same two who were present at the ringside each night.

#### **OFFICIALS**

Technical officials, not including office staff, totalled forty and three more could have been used had there been a telephone line to the scoreboard.



## LAWN TENNIS

The Lawn Tennis tournament was held on two hard (En Tout Cas) courts at Albert Park from August 29th to September 6th inclusive.

The tournament was conducted under the rules of the International Lawn Tennis Federation, and the Dunlop Fort Tennis ball was used.

The courts, which were resurfaced by the Suva City Council especially for the Games, played well and the surface was true. The screening of the courts and provision of scoreboard were also carried out by the Council from whom much help was received.

Due to having only two suitable courts available, and having had eleven entries from competing territories, a "knock out" was the only form of tournament which could be played to conclusion in the time available. A three-quarter final between the two losing semi-finalists was played to decide third place for the Bronze Medal.

The draw for the tournament was made by Councillor C. A. Stinson, Mayor of Suva on Thursday, August 15th at Government Buildings in the presence of delegates from various South Pacific Games Committees and the press.

Play was scheduled to commence at 9 a.m. daily with a short break for lunch, and continued at 2 p.m. until 12 matches had been played.

The weather continued fine during the whole period of the tournament and the schedule was maintained throughout.

A total of 87 matches, 198 sets and 1,785 games were played during the tournament.

Officials were drawn from local clubs on a voluntary basis. Due to the duration of the tournament, the heaviest burden fell upon the few umpires who were available. An idea of the work and effort put in by these officials to ensure the smooth running of the tournament might best be judged from the fact that some 25 officials put in over 1,000 man hours during the eight-day period.

The standard of umpiring and line judging was high considering that most officials prior to the Games had had little previous experience in top-class tournaments and none in international events.



## RUGBY FOOTBALL

All matches except one were played at Buckhurst Park, the exception was the first match between Tonga and Fiji, that was played at Churchill Park, Lautoka, on Saturday, 31st August.

It had been expected that teams would come, in addition, from American Samoa and Niue, and it had been intended each team would play the other once, but with two teams withdrawing, the three teams played each other twice. As a result of the very tight programme, it was necessary to play six games in seven days as none of the teams taking part wished to play on Sunday. In future it will be necessary to achieve at least one days rest between games, if only to allow time for recovery from minor injuries.

The games were played under the rules of the International Rugby Board, with one exception, referred to later.

Difficulties were experienced due to nominations for players having to be in some time before the opening of the games and players being injured between nomination and departure. This however has been remedied by the amendment to the Games Charter.

#### REFEREES

It is most desirable for games of this nature, that only qualified officials should be in control of the games and contests, however none of the territories competing, and a very few of the Rugby playing countries have an official referee grading system, thus the general recommendation is very difficult to apply to Rugby. Secondly, it is usual in Rugby for visiting teams to be offered a panel of referees from which to make their choice. These are normally leading referees of the host country. It was decided to adopt this principle and four were chosen.

#### THE PITCH

The pitch used was the same as the standard Association Football pitch, namely seventy yards by one hundred and ten, as it had to be used also for this purpose. It was also sited inside the 400 metre running track.

In spite of tremendous efforts by the ground staff to change all the markings over, this arrangement did not work out entirely satisfactorily. The dead ball area overlapped on to the track and the drainage channel on the inner side of the track was a potential danger to the players and had to be filled in temporarily for each match.

#### EQUIPMENT

Two new balls were provided for each match which was unnecessary, one would have been sufficient with the previously used ball as a standby.

The marker posts were made of three-quarter inch square wood and broke too easily along a diagonal grain. They should be made one inch square and from selected straight-grained timber.

The goal posts were padded to six feet and this was satisfactory.

Eight ball-boys were placed round the pitch to retrieve the ball and to prevent the necessity of players running across the track.

No provision was made for a scoreboard: this was an omission that caused adverse spectator criticism.

Visiting teams did not bring their touch-flags as had been expected. It is however suggested that these be provided by the host territory in future so as to achieve uniformity in size and shape.

#### TRAINING FACILITIES

Arrangements were made for one training pitch for each team, rain however made two of the grounds unusable, so two others had to be found at short notice which was not easy in view of the competing demands. A scrummaging machine was also made available, although this had not been previously arranged and it is suggested that in future both scrummaging machine and tackling machine be available at a central point on a rota system.

Practice games with local teams were arranged for visiting teams, before the opening to enable the visitors to familiarise themselves with local conditions. Both visiting teams made full use of their opportunities and were appreciative of them.

#### TECHNICAL COMMITTEE

In order to arrange the programme, the order in which the teams would play each other had to be settled beforehand and this was approved by the Technical Committee. The Committee also decided that the rule regarding sprigs should not be insisted upon owing to local conditions allied with the non-availability of alternative sprigs.

## SWIMMING

The swimming was held at the Suva Sea Baths which were built many years ago and are owned by the Suva City Council. The pool is 55 yards long by 25 yards over the competition area and is filled direct from the sea without filtration. This lack of filtration makes it difficult, especially at the time of the year when prolonged rain washes mud into the estuary, to keep the pool filled with clear water. To get over this difficulty the suction pipe was extended out into the sea but in spite of that, there was difficulty in keeping the pool clean during the Games.

#### POOL

To bring the pool to international requirements a large amount of temporary work was undertaken by the Suva City Council. Additional lighting was put up which was a tremendous improvement on the previous lighting but it will pay host territories to ensure that the lighting is considered as an integral part of the pool design. It is considered that a minimum width of pool surround of eighteen feet is desirable along the sides and this width could well be increased at the ends.

#### **OFFICIALS**

A formidable number of officials is required to organise such a meeting under F.I.N.A. rules and much help was given by the Royal New Zealand Air Force and H.M.S. Cook. Three lectures were held and practical experience was gained at two trial meetings, in the second of which, over two hundred swimmers participated which gave a reasonable opportunity to solve problems and deal with administrative training. It would be preferable if the officials could be assembled rather sooner.

In spite of their short training however, all the officials did their respective jobs well and no adverse criticism was heard, indeed compliments were paid on the high standard achieved.

#### TIMEKEEPING

Timekeeping is the essential part of a swimming competition, especially in the heats where time is the factor which decides the finalists and it is gratifying to report that an examination of the result cards indicated a very high degree of accuracy. Omega timekeepers were used by the lane timekeepers but as there were insufficient of these, the reserve timekeepers had to use ordinary Omega stopwatches which were tested and certified prior to the meeting.

#### RECORDING


Results were to hand in a commendably short time after events considering that eighteen times had to be recorded in the majority of cases. A consolidated report sheet was prepared from the individual result cards and a copy of the results sheet was handed to team managers, press and radio officials immediately after the meeting. This service was favourably commented on.

#### PROGRAMME

It was considered that the programme of events was not realistic for the First South Pacific Games in view of the standard that would probably be forthcoming. Ten days before the opening of the Games the fact that there was no definite information as to the numbers of entrants made it very difficult to draw up a programme. Normally the swimmers, fit the programme whereas in this case the programme was designed to suit the swimmers as far as possible.

It is considered that three nights is inadequate; as it was, the heats of the 1650 yards freestyle were held separately and the programme imposed a severe strain upon the competitors.

Whether or not the programme is revised, it would seem that some non-Games events will always need to be included in order to give competitors adequate rests. These "fillers" need considerable thought and it is recommended that if this suggestion is accepted, careful consideration be given to these events. The general public in Fiji was not educated to the fact that fairly long intervals are unavoidable

in international competitions and they rapidly lost interest and became bored unless there was something to entertain them.

- (1) It is suggested that a 4 x 110 free-style relay with two men and two women be included in the programme:
- (2) that four nights be allocated for swimming with provision for heats to be held outside these nights if found necessary or desirable by the Technical Committee;
- (3) that competing territories be requested to submit to the host territory at least two months before the Games are due to open, a provisional estimate of the number of competitors they envisage entering for each event;
- (4) that consideration be given to including water polo as an official event in the programme.

#### VENUE

- That not less than eight, seven-foot lanes be provided if at all possible.
- (2) That a separate entrance be provided for officials and competitors some distance away from the one used by spectators.
- (3) That access to stands be otherwise than via the pool surrounds.

#### INTERPRETATION

Efforts by the organisers to secure the services of a competent French interpreter prior to the opening of the Games were unsuccessful and they were extremely fortunate that M. Jacques Duffayet of the New Caledonia swimming team was able and willing to fill this important position.



## TABLE TENNIS

The manner in which the event was to be played had caused some difficulty: Should it be played off as a series of individual championships, men's and women's singles and doubles, also mixed doubles, or should it be played as a team event?

It was decided that as the charter laid down that Lawn Tennis was to be played as a team event, in order to encourage the participation of women, it was proper that table tennis should also be played as a team event.

#### TRAINING ARRANGEMENTS

The visiting teams practised at the hall where the matches were played, the Fiji team at a private house.

One incident occurred that cast light on the organisational deficiency on the part of the Technical Committee: the G. & E.I.C. team failed to turn up for their play-off against Tonga, owing to not being told. They should by rights have lost by default, however the Tongan team manager, in a very sporting gesture, offered to play his defaulting opponents the next day - in the event Tonga lost, which made the gesture the more impressive. This lack of good communications is referred to under the heading of "Technical Committees".

## VOLLEYBALL

Considerable difficulty was experienced in preparing for volleyball as the game was hardly played in Fiji and there was no experience to draw upon.

#### VENUE

The need for spectator accommodation decided the site for the pitch, which was in front of the main stand at Albert Park, next to the Women's Basketball, but the two courts could not be used simultaneouly. The playing area was screened with six foot wide hessian.

This course was unsatisfactory and as the competition developed, the wind became a dominant factor in the game, one end developing into the attacking end the other the defensive end, and it was obvious that if the game had to be held outside, then the screening should have been very much higher and more substantial than it was, to eliminate wind effect. With the likelihood of a strong breeze from one direction, it would have been better and preferable to have played indoors.

#### EQUIPMENT

As a result of the wind, and in spite of the net cord being as tight as possible, a sag in the net inevitably developed below regulation height.

Unfortunately, the balls that were provided did not comply with the International Rules of Volleyball, being made of rubber instead of leather. A

very kind offer of three leather balls was made by the team from French Polynesia, but this was not accepted by the Technical Committee for various reasons.

#### PRACTICE FACILITIES

These proved to be unsatisfactory in general. The very bad weather for the first three weeks in August had not given the practice courts a chance to dry out and the wind at times made them impossible to use. An old tennis court which was also used was well sheltered but, having a different surface, was also unsatisfactory.

All the teams voiced their concern at not being able to practice on the main court and it is most desirable that practice courts be available in future having the same characteristics as the match court(s).

#### **OFFICIALS**

The complete absence of experienced officials in Fiji had been a source of worry prior to the Games and much help was received from visiting team officials.

After the Games were over, a letter which took a very long time to arrive was received from the American Volleyball Association offering the services of two International Referee/Umpires for the Games; this offer could, with advantage, be followed up.



## ORGANISING COMMITTEE

The Organising Committee held 73 meetings prior to the Games, and 6 afterwards; the membership was increased as necessary as the work developed.

Apart from the Original nucleus which consisted of: J. H. Common (Chairman), L. O. Simpson (Secretary), K. C. Gajadhar (Assistant Secretary), A. F. Varea, all subsequent appointments, except those marked with an asterisk, were, ipso facto, chairmen of sub-committees. In making these selections, each individual was first approached and asked if he or she would serve — the job explained and after appointment each Chairman was given a completely free hand in the choice of his or her sub-committee.

The Chairman of the Finance Sub-committee, Mr. E. R. Richards was not a member of the Organising Committee for reasons which are given under the Finance Committee Report.

On the departure of Mr. Madams, his place was taken by Mr. R. J. Woodman.

Of the committee, only two members had even been present at international games, and with the departure to New Zealand of Mr. Simpson, this was reduced to one, Mr Ragg.

On his way home to the United Kingdom, the Chairman called on the Director of Organisation of the VIIth British Empire and Commonwealth Games at Perth and spent some time with him and, as a result, not only were all the minutes of the Perth Games' Committees made available to the Organising Committee, but the Chairman was invited to Perth for a month as a guest of the Perth Organising Committee before and during the Perth Games. This was of tremendous benefit to the Chairman who was given every assistance possible to see what made games successful. In addition, there were present at Perth, the Secretary of the Committee who went as a team manager, also Mr. Martin, the Chairman of the Fiji Amateur Sports Association and Mr Ragg as General Team Manager. These visits were of immense importance and helped immeasurably with the planning of the work. During his stay in the United Kingdom in 1962, the Chairman made personal contact with the Secretary of the International Amateur Athletic Federation and the Chairman and Secretary of the Association International de Boxe Amateur in London and also the Secretary of the Federation Internationale de Football Association in Zurich. These personal contacts were of great value.

By July 1962 a year before the games, it had become obvious that the limits of part time organisers was being reached and that very soon someone must be available with secretarial assistance and the Committee was fortunate in being able to get the services of Mr. F. J. Coyne who had many years experience of International Games. He arrived in Fiji on January 18th and remained until September 28th and was of immeasurable help.

In the view of the Committee, it is imperative that a full time experienced organiser be established at least 12 months before the games and preferably 18 months, together with a secretary to ease the burden on those who have a job to do and whose time and availability through the day is strictly limited.

Difficulty of communications with certain territories over the immense area of the South Pacific, makes correspondence difficult, and some of the difficulties that faced the committee for the first games will not, it is be hoped be repeated, nevertheless they are all recorded. If nothing else is read in this report, it is hoped that the following paragraphs (a) to (d)

will be read, learned and most thoroughly digested by all Territorial National Sports Associations and National Controlling Bodies. By no means all territories were offenders and there were notable exceptions to the following strictures. Many offended through ignorance, but there is now no excuse.

- (a) The Committee, under its terms of reference in the draft constitution, had to decide on the events, and this could only be settled by knowing what territories would take part in what events and accordingly a circular was sent out in August 1961 asking for replies by December. Three replies were received in between two and four weeks. All the remaining territories had to be cabled on December 29th asking for immediate replies;
- (b) Information was asked for as to likely numbers — this again was not always forthcoming, so the amount of accommodation required could only be guessed
- Entry forms were asked for by a certain date; many were late and one had to be requested by cable. When the answer was received it did not make sense — it did not agree with the official entry forms when these finally did arrive, and neither agreed with a second confirmatory cable that came as a result of cabled enquiries. An immense amount of work had to be done once all the entries were received and delay and mistakes in one entry caused a lot of unnecessary work;
- (d) In short, it is imperative that circulars asking for information be answered promptly and accurately. If the information is not immediately available, then an acknowledgment is the least that can be sent together with information as to when it will be available. Dead silence for months is both discourteous and infuriating to those who are awaiting the information and whose work is held up.

One of the major difficulties of the Games was the question of affiliations with International Bodies and much time was spent on this. This is dealt with more fully under the heading of affiliations.

# **ACCOMMODATION COMMITTEE**

The Committee consisted of the following people:-

Mrs. V. A. R. Common (Chairman)

Mrs. J. Reid, Mr M. Hunt (Union Steam Ship Co.) and Mr. R. M. Michael (U.T.A.) Secretary.

This Committee was appointed for two purposes:-

> 1. To handle all accommodation for people directly or indirectly connected with visiting teams who were not housed in the village,

> > and

to handle all requests for accommodation from overseas that came to the games organisation.

They were also asked to ensure that every team and every single visitor for whom they had arranged accommodation was met either at the wharf if arriving by sea, at the village if arriving by road from Nadi, or at Nausori if arriving by air and this was achieved with the exception of a small group from the Gilbert & Ellice Islands which arrived unheralded a fortnight before the opening. This party was however happily installed within an hour of their arrival.

It appeared from the beginning that hotels and boarding houses would not be able to cope with the expected visitors, so an appeal was made to private householders to offer bed and breakfast for 15/- per day. There was a big response. All proffered accommodation was visited so that visitors could be matched to their prospective hosts.

The first letter which was sent out to territories in the early part of 1962 was a request for general guidance as to the number of visitors that we might expect. This however was much too early and the response was virtually nil.

At the end of May, 1963, three months before the opening, letters were sent to all territories setting out the limited hotel and boarding house accommodation still available and quoting rates. Private house accommodation was available ad-lib. Replies were requested by June 30th. Once again replies were very disappointing.

Individual letters were again sent to each territory in mid-July as only six weeks remained and this time there was a much better response although the information was still vague in many cases and up to the last night before the opening, hotel managers and boarding house proprietors, who were all most helpful and co-operative, were still patiently changing bookings as times of arrival had to be changed when scraps of information came filtering in.

The accommodation committee worked in very close collaboration with those dealing with the accommodation of the teams to sort out the many problems that arose.

It is recommended that in future something on the following lines be adopted:-

- (1) that an accommodation committee be set up twelve months before the games;
- (2) that meetings be held with the hotel and boarding house owners and that all available beds be scheduled:
- (3) that six months before the games, travel agencies, hotel and boarding house owners tell the accommodation committee, periodically and at progressively shorter intervals, of all bookings that they have made (there were a suprising number of double requests for accommodation) everyone will thus know just what is available;
- that territories be asked to submit detailed lists of V.I.P. accommodation and all other accommodation required by visitors from their territory not less than one month before the games are due to open;
- (5) that any changes be notified as soon as
- that a reserve of private accommodation be available for use at the last moment so that no one has to be turned away.

It is worth noting that the private accommodation worked out extremely well and that the effort needed to meet each and every visitor was well worthwhile if the appreciative comments of the visitors was a guide.

In conclusion, while it is realised that some visitors want to make their own hotel accommodation reservations, it would have been far more satisfactory if all visitors from participating territories made their booking arrangements through the accommodation committee, which was in the best position to know what was available.

# **OPENING**

The Opening Ceremony requires rehearsing to be sure of success but with teams not arriving until the last moment, not even a rehearsal with key personnel was possible. Skeleton rehearsals were however held and the Opening Ceremony went off very satisfactorily.

The Royal New Zealand Air Force Sunderland was timed to arrive immediately after the Games flag was broken at the mast-head. The flag was much larger than usual and there was a stiff breeze blowing, with the result that the securing snapped and the flag broke itself at the mast-head a considerable time before scheduled. The Captain of the Sunderland saw the flag and naturally assumed that he should come in, which he did at zero altitude,

effectively silencing His Excellency the Governor's opening speech. However the Governor's recovery from this unexpected interruption and his comments thereon added a pleasant touch of humour to the occasion.

The team managers were all most co-operative and punctual in getting their teams to the assembly and in forming up.

# **FLAGS**

In spite of requests for teams to bring a certain number of flags of a predetermined size, this was not done in all cases. Some teams arrived with too few flags, some with none at all and others with flags too large. Flags were still being made on the morning of the opening day. It is recommended that in future a sample flag is obtained from each territory and the Games organisation provide the correct number and size of flags required.

It is felt that whilst there are objections to the use of military personnel to carry territory nameboards and flags, until all teams can be got to the host territory in ample time for a proper rehearsal for the opening, there is no alternative. Military personnel available before hand can be rehearsed and trained to carry properly whatever has to be carried and it is recommended that this method of providing at least a skeleton of the parade who know just where the teams they lead have to go, and what they have to do, should be retained.

# COMMUNICATIONS AND PRESS

# GENERAL

The responsibility for the provision of all press and communications facilities for the South Pacific Games was borne by the Fiji Posts and Telegraphs Department, which was represented on the Organising Committee, by the Postmaster-General, Mr. W. G. J. Cruickshank, with Mr. J. R. Greig, Senior Inspector, directly responsible for technical planning, installation and control during the Games.

The Department provided full postal services at villages and Buckhurst Park, issued four commemorative stamps, first day covers and a special cancelling date stamp with an athletic motif, which was destroyed after the Games.

A small Press and Communications sub-comwas formed in August, 1962, but in the event, consisted entirely of personnel of the Posts and Telegraphs Department, who made all the necessary preliminary contacts with interested parties and coordinated the demands of the various broadcast, press and public relations bodies.

The scope of the press and communication facilities was as follows:—

- (i) Telephone lines to press boxes.
- (ii) Messenger services to press boxes for telegrams.
- (iii) Public Address equipment at all venues with facilities for playing victory anthems.
- (iv) Portable transceivers for ground and transport control.
- (v) P.B.X. switchboard service at Buckhurst Park linking all control points and main offices.
- (vi) Miscellaneous telephone lines such as between the boxing ring and the boxer's dressing room.
- (vii) P.B.X. telephone services at the villages with Public call boxes.
- (viii) Broadcast relay lines to most venues.

# **PLANNING**

The services were planned in consultation with the various organisations concerned. Of these, broadcasting, police and some of the sporting committees were able to supply fairly complete details of their requirements but generally it was necessary for the Post Office to make its own assessment of the services to be provided. This was done early in 1963 to ensure that sufficient lines would be available to the various venues. Not all the venues were known, but most of them could be safely anticipated.

A survey of the equipment available locally showed that there was insufficient and arrangements were therefore made to hire additional gear from Australia.

# SCHEDULE OF P.A. EQUIPMENT

On hand locally — 1 — 100 watt, 100v line amplifier; 1—30 watt, 600 ohm line amplifier A.W.A. (Same as hired amplifiers); 1 — loud hailer; 6 — folded horn loudspeakers on portable mountings; 2 — high impedance microphones; 2 — special adjustable microphone stands; all cabling poles, and miscellaneous installation material.

From Australia: — 3 — 30 watt, 600 ohm line amplifiers; 2 — 20 watt, 600 ohm line amplifiers; 4 — 3 speed tape recorders with output connections for connection to the amplifiers; 6 — microphones, hypercordioil response; 2 — microphones, non-directional; 8 — microphone leads of varying lengths; 11 — microphone stands short, medium and tall; 4 microphone switches; 15 horn loudspeakers; 20 cabinet loudspeakers with volume control; 2 vertilinear colum loudspeakers.

The schedule of equipment was prepared on the basis that at each venue, loudspeakers would be permanently installed for the duration of the Games, but the amplifiers, tape recorders, microphones, microphone leads, switches and stands would be transported from venue to venue as required; and that a duplicate set of all the equipment, except the loudspeakers, would be available for standby purposes at each venue.

The equipment performed very well, with only three minor breakdowns occurring, none of which caused any inconvenience to the running of the sports.

# BRIEF TECHNICAL DESCRIPTIONS OF P.A. INSTALLATIONS: BUCKHURST PARK

This was the main installation and it required special consideration to meet all requirements. The main facilities required of the installation, were as follows:—

# ANNOUNCING POSITIONS

Within the main stand: It was necessary to be able to announce from almost anywhere without feedback effects (from the front for speeches, 2 or 3 different positions for the various sports announcers, and amongst the audience for interpreters). Out in the centre of the arena: For athletics, with an alternative position at the back of the grounds in the event of wet weather.

# ANNOUNCING FACILITIES

Switching in of up to three microphones, e.g. closing ceremony, required — speeches from front of main stand, translations from back of the stand, microphones for the choir singing.

**Restrictions:** Minimum disturbance to broadcasting announcers.

The answer to the problem was a system with low-level distribution all around the main stand and horn loudspeakers around the perimeter of the arena. This allowed ample gain to be used for all inputs (the microphone lead to the centre of the ground was 350 feet long) without feedback.

A separate system was used for the basket-ball courts at Buckhurst Park.

# ALBERT PARK (Womens Basketball and Volleyball)

A 20-watt amplifier was used to feed 5 — cabinet speakers along the back of the stand and two horns out from the stand, with the announcer positioned at the front.

# **TENNIS COURTS**

A simple 20-watt amplifier and loudspeaker installation was used.

# SWIMMING BATHS

A 20-watt amplifier was used to feed 5 cabinet loudspeakers in the stand and two horn loudspeakers along the sides of the pool.

# BOXING

This was held in a wharf shed and to overcome the difficult acoustics afforded by hard surfaces, special vertilinear column loudspeakers were employed.

# TABLE TENNIS HALL

A 20-watt amplifier was used to give a low-level distribution to four loudspeakers.

At none of the venues could the ideal of an enclosed announcers box be obtained, so that acoustic feedback and background disturbance had to be carefully guarded against. A lot depended on the ability of the announcers to cope with conditions, particularly at the boxing where the background noise was very high.

# TELEPHONE ARRANGEMENTS AT BUCKHURST PARK

A P.B.X. was installed in the main office under the stand providing four public exchange lines to serve the press, police, doctor, etc. and local intercommunication facilities for the control of meetings.

The system was most extensively used for the control of athletic meetings. The manager sat out in the centre of the arena, with the announcer, and from two telephones was able to keep in touch with all main points in the ground.

# **USE OF TRANSCEIVERS**

These were used by those in charge of bus transport to call up buses, and by the secretary of the organising committee for constant contact with the main office. They were also available for field communication but were little used for this purpose.

# TECHNICAL STAFFING

Two technicians were in attendance at every function, and they were transported by two continuously available vehicles.


# CONCLUSION

The same equipment would be suitable for future games, with possibly one or two refinements e.g. difficulty occurred with the switching of 3 microphone inputs on the Buckhurst Park amplifier. Installation work should commence six weeks before the games to allow for abnormal wet weather, such as experienced at Suva before the Games. The best possible announcers should be obtained from the point of view of microphone manner and the ability to keep the meeting moving along.

# FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee was appointed in July 1963 on the recommendation of the Auditor and consisted of:-

On the departure of Mr. Meeks his place was taken by Mrs. J. E. Perks.

The committee was asked to examine all accounts for payment and this developed into an onerous task since, in the last minute rush, much was done in a great hurry.

Finance Committee

In retrospect, it was probably in this facet of their work that the Organising Committee were not sufficiently foresighted.

This committee should have been formed at the very beginning to consider and approve all estimates and expenditure from beginning to end. This would have made tidying up the accounts a straight-forward matter.

# FUND RAISING COMMITTEE

The Committee was formed in March 1962 and consisted of the following persons:-

Mr. T. J. Gemmell acted as secretary until his departure from the Colony in mid-1963, when Mr. R. O. Marsack was co-opted, and accepted the position of Secretary.

Mr. Madams left before the work of the Committee was finally wound up and this was done by Mr. Woodman, who took his place in the Organising Committee.

# TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Committee was originally given the task of raising £5,000, to help stage the Games. As it became obvious to the Organising Committee that the cost was likely to be more than anticipated, the Fund Raising Committee agreed to do its utmost to raise a total of £10,000; it succeeded in raising just on £10,750.

# INITIAL DIFFICULTIES

Up to the time of the formation of the Committee, very little effective publicity had been done in connection with the forthcoming Games. In the early stages the Committee was continually being asked, "What are these Games?" "Where are they to be?" The first task of the Committee, therefore, had to be general publicity; in Fiji, this is a slow business and it was six months to a year before the Committee felt that the objects and purposes of the Games were adequately appreciated throughout the, Colony. Although members of the Committee worked with sustained enthusiasm throughout the long campaign, until the last few months it was difficult to raise real interest even among many business houses.

# LAUNCHING THE CAMPAIGN

The Committee decided that the campaign should be officially launched, with as much publicity as possible, in May 1962. For this purpose a Ball was held in Suva, and the campaign was declared open by His Excellency the Governor, Sir Kenneth Maddocks. Although this event was well-planned and enjoyed by all those present, it was poorly attended and resulted in a loss. It was, however valuable publicity for the campaign.

# NATURE OF FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES

The Committee decided that its main efforts to raise funds should be in connection with the following:-

- (a) A Colony-wide lottery;
- (b) Balls and dances;
- (c) Individually run activities, such as clothes stalls, raffles, bazaars, etc.:
- (d) Theatrical productions. Film shows;
- An appeal to schools;
- Appeals to clubs, sports associations, etc.;
- (g) An appeal to business houses:
- (h) General appeal to the public;
- (i) Special schemes by individual firms.

In addition, through the enthusiasm of district, communities, appeals were organised, notably in Ba/ Tavua, Labasa and Nadi.

# Results of Activities

# LOTTERY

The launching of a lottery on the scale contemplated (first prize £3,000) required amendments to legislation. The co-operation of Government, in this respect, and of numerous government departments, in the operation of the Lottery, was much appreciated. Originally, it was thought that the Lottery would be fully subscribed within four to six months of opening. This, however, proved to be an over-optimistic view. In the long run, however, the Lottery was fully subscribed and provided an important part of the revenue required. There were however objections raised on religious grounds to getting money by this method.

# **BALLS AND DANCES**

As already stated, a loss resulted from the opening Ball and thereafter the Committee was chary of itself organising events of this nature. Where, however, organisations expressed a desire to assist the Committee by running events themselves, and the Committee was satisfied that the desire was a genuine one, full support was given. Similar events were also organised by individual members of the Committee.

# GENERAL

Individual members of the committee specialised in different directions such as raffles, bazaars and theatrical productions. Film nights were held

whilst other organisations and individuals contributed both by communities and industrial organisations in various ways.

# COMMENT

In retrospect, it is clear that the work of the Committee would have been far easier, at least in the early stages, if organised publicity for the Games had been commenced, say, six or twelve months before the Fund Raising campaign began. The work of the Committee did, in fact, involve both publicity and fund raising, in the early stages: this situation should be avoided in the future. On the other hand, the fact that the Committee did reach its target indicates success, although the result was doubtful until the last few months.

# MEDICAL COMMITTEE

A doctor was in attendance each morning at the three villages to run daily clinics and from the opening to the end of the games there were about 250 consultations in all.

A general analysis gave the following results:—



There were two fractures — in one case a boxer fractured a bone in his hand and, in another, an association football player suffered a compound fracture of the leg.

There was a doctor present at all times at Buckhurst Park whilst events were in progress, whilst two doctors were always present when boxing was being held.

Ambulances were also present at Buckhurst Park and at the boxing venues whenever any events were on.

Red Cross and St. John Ambulance teams were in constant attendance at Buckhurst Park and Albert Park and a great debt of gratitude is owed to these two organisations for the way in which they carried out their work.

# PUBLICITY COMMITTEE


The amount of publicity, which has to be paid for, caused a great deal of thought.

Owing to the shortage of accommodation in Suva for visitors, it was decided to limit the amount spent in this direction and not to send a vast number of give-away folders overseas, limiting the overseas activity to posters.

In the event, as will be seen from the Accommodation Committee report, further expenditure would not have been financially justfiable. There were however complaints, particularly from New Zealand, that more information should have been provided.

As soon as the final programme was settled, 20,000 leaflets were printed and sent out and these proved an excellent medium. In addition, with the local interest in Rugby, a like number were printed for that game.

A brochure, sponsored by a local firm, was prepared giving the full programme together with other information: this however was not a success, particularly in view of the work involved in compilation and the difficulties in getting information about competitors.

# TICKETS COMMITTEE

The Committee was set up in September 1962 under the chairmanship of Mr. L. M. Rolls who had offered to accept responsibility for the tickets. The inaugural meeting was held on September 14th, 1962.

# COMMITTEE

The Chairman chose the members of his committee, so that each could bring to the job specific help in certain directions and in practice this worked extremely well.

Mr. Adams is an officer of the Union Steam Ship Company and his membership was invited on the basis that this company would be most suited to conduct the overseas agencies for the sale of tickets. Mr. Ram Shankar is an officer of an insurance company and was invited for his contacts with the Indian community with which so much work would have to be done. Mr. Furrer is an architect whose talents would be of value in the preparation of seating plans. Mr. Taylor is an accountant whose service would be invaluable in connection with accounting procedure and the organisation of the box office. Mr. Scott was asked to join the committee in view of his experience as a committee secretary.

This choice of members, in order to get the services of professional people who specialised in the various sides of the committee's activities, worked very well in practice.

The Chairman also decided that formal meetings were unsuitable for the type of work to be carried out and all the work was done by informal discussions with the people concerned. After the inaugural meeting, only one other formal meeting was held on May 14th, 1963 to summarize the work that had been done to date and to check over arrangements made for ticket sales for the boxing contest between Fiji and a team of Australian boxers on 25th May, which was to be used as a test of the facilities that had been set up.

# **OVERSEAS AGENCIES**

One of the first considerations was the establishment of overseas agencies for the sale of tickets. The Organising Committee had decided that owing to shortage of accommodation in Suva, the emphasis should be on attracting visitors from the participating territories and that little should be done to encourage the purchase of seats by people in Australia and New Zealand, although there were some visitors from these two countries.

The Union Steam Ship Company was therefore an obvious choice as an overseas agency since the Company has Branch Managers in all the territories taking part and they did much in the dissemination of order forms, information and so on.

Whilst fewer seats were sold this way than had been originally expected, the placement of orders went very smoothly and not one complaint was received from those who got their tickets this way.

# SCHEDULING TICKETS

Each sport was allocated a colour and this was used for passes, badges and tickets.

When the seating plans were complete, full information had still not been received from territories as to the sports that they were going to take part in, which caused delays in working out the programmes and that in turn held up the printing of the tickets. This can only be solved by getting everything under way much earlier, as should be possible in future games.

As a result of repeated checking, and in spite of changes, 40,000 individual seat tickets covering ten days and ten sports, giving block number, row number and seat number, on different dates and in different colours, were printed without a single error or a single duplication of ticket.

# SEATING PLANS

The work of preparing seating plans was held up in some cases as decisions on the amount of temporary seating to be provided were delayed for various reasons. These decisions should have been taken twelve months before the Games, although the delay did not have any effect on the availability of tickets when required. It does however mean that work can go ahead steadily, instead of there being a rush at the end.

It was first thought that seat widths would have to be twenty inches for bench type seats but this was later reduced to eighteen inches and appeared to be satisfactory.

It is worth while making proper drawings of temporary seating as this can be used as the basis for the seating plans.

# TICKET FORMAT

First South Pacific Games Official Report

The size of the ticket 3" x 5" was found satisfactory from all aspects except that of the thickness of the paper, however a robust ticket has so many advantages that the bulk has to be accepted.

With regard to the tear-off portion, it was found necessary to have two perforations providing two tear-off sections for admission to those venues where there was standing room available as well as seating. At venues with reserved seating only one tear-off section was required. Prices were not printed on the tickets.

On the reverse side of all tickets, two conditions of admission were printed, one concerning the admission only of the bearer, and the other stating that the sale was conditional upon the non-playing of transistor radios. Only very rarely did stewards have to draw spectators' attention to this condition.

#### **BOX OFFICE SALES**

After every single ticket had been examined and checked they were taken into the control of the accounting member of the committee and issued to the box office. At the end of each day, a daily sales record was prepared and checked against the markings on the box plans and balanced against cash.

Sale of tickets was slow initially but as it developed it was found that the box office was too small to handle the customers fast enough, so a second box office was established and the events divided.

In view of the slowness in sales, it was decided that sales in the town should continue up to 5.30 in the afternoon for events the following morning and up to midday for afternoon and evening events. The unsold reserved seats were then made available at the venues two hours before the events started.

Whilst this met a public demand, it was felt in retrospect that it was not worth all the difficulties. It is considered that it would be far more practical to close the reserved seats for an event in the evening, two days prior to the event taking place. This would give the accounting and sales staff a full day to reconcile the sales. Facilities could then be provided at the venue for the sale of the balance of the unsold seats.

# CASH CONTROL AT VENUES

As the Games got under way, the handling of cash became more difficult with events in progress at three venues at a time.

A cash float has to be delivered to each venue well before the gates are opened, together with all unsold reserved seats and rolls of admission tickets for unreserved areas. After the session, the cash and tickets had to be balanced. This was easy at the smaller places, but at Buckhurst Park it was not easy. It is recommended that whilst a small group can handle the ticket arrangements in the preliminary stage, a larger team is necessary whilst the Games are on, so that there is some one person on the Committee in charge at each venue for each session, apart from those engaged elsewhere.

# SEATING FOR OFFICIALS AND COMPETITORS

The number of free seats to be provided for competitors and officials gave much worry and the final number of seats set aside for each sport was as follows:—

In addition to the above seats, all officials and competitors passes allowed them in to the standing area at Buckhurst Park for Athletics, Association Football and Rugby; there was also a special reserved area for athletes at Buckhurst Park.

All competitors and team managers must be allowed in to watch their own events. General team managers and chefs-de-mission also must be able to get in to all events. For the events marked with an asterisk, there was however only seating accommodation and that of a limited nature, so it was a question of trying to balance the anticipated demand for seating for competitors etc. with the need to sell as many seats as possible.

In the event, there was not a great demand for seats for Basketball (Women) and Volleyball, whilst for Basketball (Men) and Lawn Tennis, a special area was kept for competitor spectators. In the case of swimming, there were so few competitors that those not swimming stayed with their teams in the competition assembly area.

# TRANSPORT COMMITTEE

Once again, considerable use was made of professionals on this committee, the Chairman of which was Mr. F. W. Goodrum, a senior member of the Department of Transport and Civil Aviation, with another member of that department in Mr. R. A. Clendenning. The third member was Mr. J. Morgan, manager of a local firm who had offered the use of his firm's vehicles.

They were directed to:-

- Arrange transport as required for the movement of athletes to and from the three villages, to the various games venues;
- (2) Arrange for transport to meet all team members on arrival in Fiji, whether by sea or air and to convey them to their respective villages; similarly to arrange return transport on their departure.
- (3) Arrange all public transport to and from games venues.
- Arrange services from villages for medical treatment, social services and sight-seeing tours.
- (5) Ensure, if possible, that total transport costs did not exceed £2,000.

Discussions were held with the Bus Transport Union (Association of Bus Operators), which agreed that it's members should charge the irreducible minimum and in the event they only charged actual operating costs, without any profit. The Oil Companies also contributed a considerable amount of free fuel.

The main problem in so far as the public was concerned, was to get them to and from Buckhurst Park, and a special circular bus service was organised from the Suva Bus Station to the Park. This got over parking difficulties out there, since the only buses required to wait were those required for the athletes. The number of buses required for the circular service could be controlled by someone on the spot and more buses called up or cancelled as necessary by radio.

The staff of the Transport Control Board was made available, also personnel from H.M.S. Cook which provided a Transport Officer at each village, to whom all requests for transport were made. He in turn passed on this information to the Central Controlling Officer who manned the telephone from 0600 to 2400 hours each day. From midnight to six in the morning, the telephone was switched through to a duty officer on call. A total of ten people was required and, in addition, the Bus Transport Union made two of their executives available twenty-four hours a day.

In practice the results were most satisfactory.

# PUBLIC TRANSPORT IN SO FAR AS BUCKHURST PARK WAS CONCERNED

At the end of the Opening Ceremony, about 7000 passengers were transported away from the Park in a total of twenty-two minutes and at the end of the Closing, about 8,500 in twenty-eight minutes —this apart from all team movements and private cars.

# TEAM TRANSPORT OVER THE EIGHTEEN DAYS

Seventeen thousand miles were run. Initially the usual difficulties were experienced in getting team members to realise the necessity of being on time to catch their buses and it was necessary to draw the attention of team managers to the need for punctuality. After that however things soon settled down to work successfully. Sight-seeing tours were very popular and it was necessary to run three buses at a time instead of the two which had been arranged. These trips covered forty-five miles of the countryside around Suva. Taxis were used for carrying small numbers and for such duties as hospital treatment and transport of team officials and for special duties during boxing sessions.


# GENERAL

Twenty buses were held solely for the use of the athletes with an average of fifteen in continuous use, the balance being on immediate call.

It was found absolutely necessary for the central control officer to be kept continually informed of all bus and taxi movements and so be able to re-route transport to obtain maximum utilisation of the seating capacity available.

# CONCLUSION

- Pre-planning of transport usage was essential both for athletes and for the public. A pool of private case would have been very desirable but not really necessary;
- (2) Radio control of transport was absolutely essential, particularly when large crowds were involved;
- (3) The Central Control Officer must have absolute authority and to be kept informed of all movements as well as estimates of crowd numbers to and from sports venues.
- (4) Team managers and officials should be made fully aware of the availability of transport and also of the need for observing time schedules.



At the closing ceremony the teams came on all intermingled, with friends from different territories walking together.

# VILLAGE COMMITTEE

The committee started off under the chairmanship of Mr. J. L. Stevens who however left the Colony for six months and handed over to Mr. D. R. Wilkinson who was assisted by:—

It was realized from the start that accommodation for athletes and team officials was not going to be easy and a basic figure of 600 was taken. The final figure actually accommodated in the three villages was 629.

With the finance available it was quite impossible to build special quarters, although attempts were made to enlist help from overseas, and it followed that schools had to be used. This meant that the school holidays determined the dates of the Games. The Director of Education very kindly made the Teachers' Training College at Nasinu available also

the Suva Grammar School at Veiuto and also, the Grammar School hostel. The latter was subsequently handed over to the Church of England which however continued to make the hostel available. Final numbers accommodated:—

The whole of the village arrangements was in the hands of the committee, whilst the overall control during the Games was in the hands of the Camp Commandant.

At the Suva Grammar School he had:—

- 2 Assistant Camp Commandants,
- 1 Matron,
- 1 Transport Officer,
- 1 Messing Officer,
- 1 Equipment Officer, and kitchen and cleaning staff.

At Nasinu he had the great good fortune to have the Acting Principal of the College in charge together with 2 Assistants Camp Commandants, the College Matron acting as Matron and there were also transport, accounts and equipment officers.

At St. Stephens hostel, staff ran the hostel, there being two Assistant Camp Commandants for discipline, liaison and transport.

At the two larger establishments, banking and post office facilities were available whilst at all three places, medical services were available. Daily laundry collections were made and Women's voluntary organisations provided a "Make and Mend" service.

The Director of Education very kindly shortened the term at Veiuto to enable the alterations to be made, three days being available, but this gave the Camp Commandant a bare twenty-four hours before the first team arrived and this was insufficient to iron out teething troubles and it was forty-eight hours after the first arrivals were on the scene before the organisation settled down.

# MESSING

One of the problems facing the organisers was to meet the different diets within the overall allowance of 20/- per day, 5/- of the 25/- daily charge being required for transport. This was largely got over by the French visitors making their own arrangements for cooking.

Quantitatively the diet was arranged in conjunction with the Dietetic Department of the South Pacific Medical Services and the only snag was that the diet, which was basically a Pacific islands diet, was not to the taste of all races. The question of quality and variety of food was a matter of Council policy — obviously the more money available the better and more varied the food — but most territories cannot afford the comparatively large sum for daily living over and above the cost of transport.

# CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

It was the wish of the Organising Committee that every General Team Manager should live in the village with his team. This wish was not however met by all teams. It was based on the experience of previous similar international games and the elementary principle that when a large number of fit and high-spirited people are living together there has to be discipline. Up to the last day there are still people who are competing and who require a full night's rest — their collegues who have been eliminated want to have some fun, which is fair enough, but those still competing must come first and to be sure that they are not disturbed at night, requires discipline.

The general conduct was extremely good although at first some of the male competitors showed a predilection for members of the female staff — this was stamped on ruthlessly by the Camp Commandant (a Royal New Zealand Air Force Station Warrant Officer with much experience in stamping) and after the third day the female staff were able to carry out their duties without fear of molestation.

It is considered that in future the following points be borne in mind:—

- (1) It should be a condition of entry that either the General Team Manager or the Deputy Team Manager should live in the village with his team, and a chaperone with the female entrants;
- (2) That all teams, wherever possible, appoint a liaison officer who should either be a resident in the host-territory, or who should arrive three days before the team, so that when the teams arrive, they can be met by someone fully briefed.
- (3) That loud speaker systems be installed in the villages so that messages can be passed quickly.







# INTERNATIONAL AFFILIATIONS

It became apparent quite early in proceedings that while some territories were well aware of their obligations in connection with affiliation to the appropriate international associations, other territories were quite unaware of what was required.

At the Council meeting it was decided that it was the responsibility of each national sports association to acquire affiliation to its individual governing bodies.

At the first games a large amount of additional work fell upon the Organising Committee to cover these gaps in affiliations and in certain cases it was only as a result of direct personal approach that it was possible to get permission to hold all the sports planned. This applied in particular to Athletics, Association Football, Boxing and Swimming.

These four international associations understood the difficulties and on this occasion gave certain waivers. For the next games however, there will have to be either direct or indirect affiliation — that is to say either the territory affiliates direct with the international headquarters of the game or indirectly through their home territory national governing body.

There are two exceptions to these:-

- (1) Basketball, Men (5 aside). This association, with Headquarters at Munich, has accepted an affiliation from the South Pacific Games Council on behalf of all participating territories.
- (2) **Boxing:** The A.I.B.A., with headquarters in London, has granted permission, on a temporary basis, for the Tongan Amateur Boxing Association and the Cook Islands Amateur Boxing Association, to affiliate to the Fiji Amateur Boxing Association and so, through Fiji, have International Federation status.

It is therefore imperative that as soon as the sports to be included in any future games are decided, that the host territory write to all the appropriate international associations informing them of the date and place of the event and ask whether there are any changes since the last games were held and let all territories know the position so that they can take action under the revised Council constitution. (Minutes on pages 28 and 29 of Council meeting refer).

All the international associations have different rules and requirements — some require a fee to accompany the formal application to hold an event, others display less concern.

The position regarding the various events held in these games was as follows:—

**Athletics:** Require very full information also an official observer to be present. Fee required: very strict affiliation regulations.

**Association** Football: Full information. Very strict affiliation regulations. No fee, but a percentage of gate to be paid.

**Basketball (Men):** Interested, but has accepted affiliation from Council provided they are kept in touch so continuing affiliation required.

**Basketball (Women):** Interested but require no affiliation at the moment.

**Boxing:** Require very full information also an official observer to be present. Fee required: Very strict affiliation regulations.

**Lawn Tennis:** Interested but require no affiliation or fee at the moment.

**Rugby:** Will not at the moment accept South Pacific Territories in association. No permission required but the situation may change.

**Swimming:** Require very full information also an official observer to be present. Fee required: very strict affiliation regulations.

**Table Tennis:** Very interested. Require full full information.

**Volleyball:** Very interested. Require full information.

All the international associations were very interested and helpful, their rules change from year to year however. It is important that ample copies of the up-to-date rules be available for all officials who require them. Individual copies must be available for all referees, judges and team managers.

# THE TECHNICAL COMMITTEES


For many of the people in the National Associations responsible for planning the events, it was their first experience of anything of this nature. The same thing applied to the Technical Committees that were responsible for running the events: indeed it was surprising that more things did not go wrong.

The situation was aggravated by the fact that with some territories only arriving just before the opening day, the Technical Committees could only meet just before the Games started.

Almost all the things that did go wrong were attributable to lack of experience.

In the case of one Committee, which met regularly, a territory sent a different delegate every time with a resulting loss in liaison with that territorial team, whilst in the case of a team that failed to turn up for a match, there was a breakdown in communications.

Arrangements can be made beforehand, but once the Games have started, it is the Technical Committee that is in charge and it is up to that committee to see that things run properly — and of necessity the secretary is almost always a member of the committee that made the preliminary arrangements. If things go wrong in the running of an event, the fault lies either with the committee of the National Association that made the original arrangements or with the Technical Committee and, in particular, the Chairman and Secretary.



# Operation Order

# SITUATION

- 1. The Opening Ceremony for the South Pacific Games will take place at BUCKHURST PARK, SUVA, on Thursday, 29th August, 1963, commencing at 1430 hrs.
- 2. His Excellency the Governor, Sir Kenneth Phipson MADDOCKS, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., will open the Games.

# MISSION

3. To define the procedure for the Opening Ceremony for the 1st South Pacific Games, 1963.

# EXECUTION

- 4. **General.** The Opening Ceremony will be divided into the following phases:—
  - Phase 1—Preparations.
    - Phase 2—Transportation of athletes and officials to Buckhurst Park.
    - Phase 3—Assembly and Forming up of participants for the Opening Ceremony.
    - Phase 4—The Opening Ceremony.
    - Phase 5—Dispersal of Participants.

# PHASE 1-PREPARATIONS

5. **General**. This phase includes the marking of the arena and the Assembly Area, rehearsal and the checking of all stores and equipment before the start of the Opening Ceremony.

# PHASE 2—TRANSPORTATION OF TEAMS AND OTHER PARTICIPANTS TO THE ASSEMBLY AREA

- 13. All athletes, officials and other groups participating in the Opening Ceremony will assemble at BUCKHURST PARK (No. 2 Ground) at 1415 hrs. Thursday, 29th August, 1963.

- 1502 hrs.—After the Royal Salute, His Excellency will inspect the Guard of Honour, accompanied by Commander Fiji Military Forces and the Aidede-Camp.
- 1507 hrs.—At the end of the inspection His Excellency, Commander Fiji Military Forces and the Aide-de-Camp will be rejoined by the Chairman of the Organising Committee and escorted to the Grandstand.
- 1507 hrs.—Guard of Honour reforms 3 ranks and march off through No. 1 Entrance and competing teams 'march on' through No. 3 Entrance. For Order of March, see Appendix I to Annexure 'B'.

Teams will march past His Excellency the Governor from the left, the Team Captains giving orders for EYES LEFT on reaching the first marker flag and EYES FRONT when the last file of the team has passed the second marker flag.

Teams will march down the arena and then manoeuvre into position by a series of right wheels. Positions will be marked by shields.

- 1540 hrs.—General Team Managers move forward to the front of the Grandstand for presentation to His Excellency the Governor by the Chairman of the Organising Committee and take their seats in the Grandstand.
- 1545 hrs.—Presentation of Games Flag by Mr. L. R. MARTIN to the Flag Party who will then march with the flag to the Flagpole where it will be furled and hoisted to the masthead.
- 1551 hrs.—Address by the Chairman of the Organising Committee at the end of which His Excellency the Governor will be invited to open the Games.
- 1552 hrs.—Address by His Excellency after which he declares the Games open followed by a fanfare of trumpets, the breaking of the Games flag, and a 'fly past' by the Royal New Zealand Air Force.
- 1555 hrs.—The competitors and officials will march forward and sit on the grass, between the 100 metres track and the fence in front of the Grandstand. The Fiji Team will go to the competitors enclosure.

At the same time the MEKE Group provided by the NA-BUA Fijian School will move out on the arena via No. 3 Entrance.

1558 hrs.—MEKE.

1608 hrs.—'Meke' group move out through No. 3 Entrance and the teams run on the arena. (Presentation of Teams)

- 28. **General.** This phase covers the dispersal of all participants in the Opening Ceremony.
  - 29. Responsibility.

- 30. At the conclusion of the Football match the teams will make their way to the buses where Capt. BUADROMO and his assistants will supervise embussing so that as soon as a bus is full, it can move off and return to the Games Villages.
- 31. Buses will be filled as participants arrive, irrespective of country or team, as long as people live in the one camp, with the aim of clearing the Bus Station as soon as possible.

- 32. **Territorial Flags.** Flag bearers will hand in all Territorial flags for safe custody until the closing Ceremony to R.S.M. SAVUA who will be located at No. 4 Entrance when teams move forward to watch the MEKE.
- 33. NABUA School pupils taking part in the Ceremony will be dispersed immediately the competitors are clear of the arena and will be taken to the SUVA Bus Station.







# VICTORY CEREMONIES

It was found possible to run the victory ceremonies with one team under the control of the Ceremonial Officer due to the timing of the events. The party commander was responsible for getting three sets of flags, two tape recorders, two sets of taped victory anthems, and the personnel to each venue at the right time.

The Ceremonial Officer was responsible for liaison between the announcers, the flag raising party and the recording operator so that immediately the medals were presented, the flags could be raised and the victory anthem played simultaneously.

Three copies of each anthem were made, one used, one as a standby on the spare machine and one in reserve. The second recording was sometimes

required for setting up the next victory anthem when that followed immediately.


Due to the standard of some of the recordings and the inherent response of the loudspeakers, the quality of the music over the amplifier system was not very good.

Some difficulties arose from the music itself. Firstly, some of the anthems arrived at the last moment and many were too long and had to be cut, causing some embarrassment, also some of the recordings were very poor. It is felt that the anthem should last for about twenty seconds or slightly less, but not more than twenty-five seconds. If longer it has been found that spectators get restless when they are asked to stand a dozen times or more during a session.
